## **Getting Started**

#### Risk Assessment

- Map your current risks across the six+ categories
- Identify priority areas needing immediate attention
- Consider both immediate and long-term risks

#### Learning from Others

- Review examples similar to your context
- Connect with networks that have implemented successful solutions
- Adapt strategies to your specific situation

#### Implementation Steps

- Start with quick wins while planning long-term solutions
- Document your process and learnings
- Build on existing community strengths

## **RCF Partners' Key Principles for Success**

#### ✓ Community Leadership

- Center community voices in solution design
- Build on existing community knowledge
- Ensure meaningful participation at all levels

#### ✓ Proactive Planning

- Develop contingency plans before crises
- Build reserves and relationships during stable times
- Invest in systems strengthening

#### ✓ Flexible Adaptation

- Maintain room to adjust strategies
- Learn from both successes and challenges
- Share learnings with other networks

- Combine strategies for maximum impact
- Build on existing community strengths

### **Area 1: Financial Resilience**

#### **Common Risk Scenario:**

Funding instability & crisis response

#### **RCF Partner Approaches:**

#### ✓ Emergency Response Systems

<u>Successful approach:</u> Coalition PLUS leveraged organizational reserves while exploring alternative funding mechanisms.

#### **Key steps:**

- Used member solidarity to continue programs
- Secured additional Global Fund support
- Simplified donor procedures to maintain services

#### ✓ Resource Mobilization

<u>Successful approach:</u> NAP+WA secured government funding for PLHIV insurance in Mauritania and Côte d'Ivoire.

#### **Key steps:**

- Built relationships with national insurance systems
- Presented evidence of community needs
- Engaged multiple stakeholders, including ministries

#### ✓ Adaptive Programming

Successful approach: DNP+ maintained impact despite reduced resources by:

- Establishing drop-in centers as service hubs
- Creating facility accompaniment systems
- Negotiating alternative documentation requirements



## **Area 2: Safety, Security and Political Risks**

#### **Common Risk Scenario:**

Anti-rights movements and restrictive legislation

#### **RCF Partner Approaches:**

#### ✓ Safety-First Programming

<u>Successful approach:</u> EWNA developed "safety matrix" to protect community researchers and prioritized safety in advocacy work.

#### **Key steps:**

- Protected identities of informants
- Facilitated safer CEDAW participation
- Created secure consultation processes

#### ✓ Alternative Implementation Models

#### Successful approach: ITPC EECA adapted by:

- Publishing through local partner organizations
- Taking low-profile approaches to sharing findings
- Consulting legal experts on publication strategies

#### ✓ Strategic Partnerships

<u>Successful approach:</u> Rise & Decriminalize movement united LGBTQI+, people who use drugs, women living with HIV and sex workers networks to counter shrinking civic space.

#### **Key steps:**

- Built cross-movement solidarity
- Shared security information
- Created collective advocacy platforms



## **Area 3: Organizational Capacity**

#### **Common Risk Scenario:**

Leadership burnout and capacity challenges

#### **RCF Partner Approaches:**

#### ✓ Mental Health & Wellbeing

**Successful approach:** Youth RISE implemented:

- Mental health leave policy
- Flexible working arrangements
- Distribution of leadership responsibilities

#### ✓ Democratic Governance

Successful approach: ENPUD built trust through:

- Creation of Expert Councils
- Transparent General Meeting processes reaching 90% participation
- Three-step voting authentication process for decisions
- Weekly work meetings for community monitoring

#### ✓ Community Building

Successful approach: EWNA strengthened movement through:

- Community consultations
- Development of harmonized position on decriminalization
- Surveys and discussions to build common understanding



## **Area 4: Programmatic Access to Services**

#### Common Risk Scenario:

Barriers to healthcare access and service discrimination

#### **Network Examples:**

- DNP+ faced barriers getting HCV treatment for homeless PWUD without identity documents in Delhi
- MENA Rosa documented healthcare providers discriminating against women living with HIV in Tunisia and Egypt
- UCTrans found 59% of trans people experienced disruptions in hormone care and 32% in ARV treatment during climate disasters

#### **RCF Partner Approaches:**

#### ✓ Alternative Service Models

Successful approach: DNP+ created accessible services through:

- Drop-in centers providing multiple services
- Facility accompaniment systems
- Training 432 community activists

#### ✓ Provider Engagement

Successful approach: MENA Rosa reduced discrimination through:

- Training 463 healthcare providers
- Creating safe spaces for WLHIV-provider dialogue
- Following up to monitor provider behavior change

#### ✓ Policy Change

Successful approach: NAP+WA secured healthcare access through:

- Government commitment to pay insurance for 101 PLHIV in Mauritania
- One million Euro commitment in Côte d'Ivoire
- Study of 3,200 PLHIV in Mali for inclusion (evidence)



## **Area 5: Movement Building and Coordination**

#### **Common Risk Scenario:**

Fragmented responses and shrinking civic space

#### **RCF Partner Approaches:**

#### ✓ Strategic Coalition Building

Successful approach: Rise & Decriminalize movement:

- United LGBTQI+, PWUD, women living with HIV and sex worker networks
- Organized high-level side meeting at AIDS 2024
- Engaged 45 representatives including ambassadors and donors

#### ✓ Evidence-Based Advocacy

Successful approach: INPUD's Global Fund engagement contributed to achieving:

- NSP expansion from 2 to 19 sites in Nigeria
- First population size estimates in Zimbabwe
- Introduction of OAT in Pakistan
- Gender-sensitive services development
- Community-led monitoring mechanisms

#### ✓ International Mechanisms

**Successful approach:** EWNA secured CEDAW recommendations for HIV decriminalization in:

- Tajikistan (2018, 2024)
- Kyrgyzstan (2021)
- Uzbekistan (2022)



## **Area 6: Measuring Success and Sustainability of Results**

#### **Common Risk Scenario:**

Difficulty demonstrating impact and maintaining momentum

#### **RCF Partner Approaches:**

#### ✓ Community-Led Monitoring

Successful approach: INPUD's monitoring contributed to achieving:

- Expanded services in 5 countries
- Community participation in funding request negotiations
- Increased harm reduction funding allocations
- Development of community-led technical briefs

#### ✓ Institutional Integration

**Successful approach:** SANOP improved prison health services through:

- Training prison officers on minimum standards
- Establishing peer education programs
- Creating health support systems
- Building community linkages post-release

#### ✓ Systems Strengthening

Successful approach: NAP+WA secured sustainable access through:

- Integration into national insurance systems
- Government budget commitments
- Systematic engagement with health authorities
- Regular monitoring mechanisms


